## LEA'S STORY OF ENCOURAGEMENT

Many of us are familiar with TV programmes such as 'Long Lost Family' who seek to reunite children who have been adopted, with their birth parents. As someone who has had the experience of being adopted 'in part', I can understand from a personal point of view those who seek to know more about their birth parents. So, the following is an account which I feel I have to share with you after learning from a letter sent by Lea Walters, a young lady in her 20s now living a fulfilled life in Australia. This account really underscores the value of caring for children when they have seemingly been cast aside by their biological parents and then rescued by those who welcome them into their homes, bring them up and try to equip them to become useful citizens and fulfilled individuals.

Lea was rescued at the age of 3 / 4 months by the Social Services in the Philippines and brought to Rehoboth Children's Home where she was cared for by 'Mamas' who made sure that she was properly fed and looked after in every way. Her name and profile was put on a special list and her adoptive parents were screened by the Social Services before allowing her to be taken from Rehoboth. She was just 3 years old when she was actually adopted but Lea doesn't really remember much of what happened, it's very much a blur and she wishes she could remember more. She does however recall the kindness of all the 'Mamas' that cared for her and made her feel that she really belonged. Lea is really grateful to all the staff at Rehoboth whom she feels played a major part in her life today.

When Lea came to Australia, she thought initially that it was just an exciting new trip with just different people who were going to look after her. She remembered she really wanted to have a sister rather than a brother but instead she ended up with 2 brothers who definitely showed her who was boss! But, Lea loved playing with them and later she realised how valuable these dear brothers were and she enjoyed becoming the best little sister she could ever be! But, growing up and knowing that she was adopted made Lea feel like she didn't really belong and she would often come alongside her

adoptive mother and give her a big hug who would in turn provide her with the reassurance of who she was and Lea later acknowledged that she was different but not so different! Lea began to read books by Todd Parr called 'The Family Book' which made her feel more confident in who she was and Lea also accepted that God had a definite plan for her life. As Lea entered adulthood, she chose to start her life working in early childhood education, here she could teach, help and develop the children in her care with real personal empathy.

Seeing and meeting other children who were adopted made her feel like she 'belonged' somewhere and the adoption family camps that her adoptive family would go on made her feel much more connected and this helped her to understand that there are many other people just like her. Sadly, Lea doesn't remember any of her native language (Tagalog) but she is working on this and trying to learn.

Lea knows that some people reading this may have also been adopted and possibly struggling with learning to feel 'belonged' so sharing this story will no doubt be an encouragement to them. Lea believes that it's important that you realise you are not alone on this journey of life and thanks to the wonderful 'Mamas' who cared for Lea and other children for a time at Rehoboth, will each come to love them and respect them for all the wonderful things that they taught the children when they were growing up. Lea says, "All our amazing adoptive parents who chose us and loved us more than we could ever possibly imagine, we love you so much even though we don't say it so often. We do thank you for holding us when we felt alone and we thank you too for the reassurance of knowing who we are and telling us that God loves us as a Father more than any of us could ever possibly know."

Lea was actually rescued from her desperate plight when her biological mother was only 14 years old when she gave birth to her. So there was no way that Lea's biological mother could have ever cared for her. It's only because of the quick thinking of the caring staff in the Filipino Social Services that Lea had the opportunity to flourish and thrive with Rehoboth before being matched with appropriate adoptive parents who welcomed Lea into their family.

As a footnote, we are also pleased to advise you that Lea's biological mother is currently 'a friend' through Social Media with Lea's adoptive parents so maybe one day, Lea will have the opportunity of meeting her biological mother in the flesh.

This story is positive because there are organisations like Rehoboth Children's Home in the Philippines who strive to rescue young babies and provide the initial support they deserve to live and thrive.
